

HELMET COLLECTION

My Russian helmet came into my collection by a visit by my sister to a Russian fire station in their town. On the day of her visit they were kind of suspicious of her wanting to take pictures, because



this was within less of a year from the fall of communism in Russia. She shot all kinds of pictures of what they would allow her to and when she got them developed she found out that the camera had not been working. During a return trip to the U.S. she told me of her visit and the poor equipment and shortage of equipment and money, the mayor in town made \$15.00 a month.

I ended up shipping some leather gloves, hood, and magazines to my sister who contacted the mayor who contacted the fire chief, both could not believe anyone from the U.S. would send them anything. The fire department set up a special open house day for my sister and brother in law; they moved all of the trucks out, demonstrated foam, water and put on demonstration of breathing equipment and all kind of stuff and allowed them to take pictures.

After my sister presented the fire chief the items I sent, she said she could see in their eyes a want for a fire so they could try the gloves and sock hood out, their gloves were more like handmade army duck material and their hoods looked like winter ski hoods.

The fire depart. gave her an award banner they won at a contest in St Petersburg, a leather belt, axe, nozzle, gloves, hood, helmet, 01[911]emergency plates, magazines pictures, etc.

Besides all that stuff I collected some 18-20 various Russian fire trucks, some of the early ones still had the USSR flag printed on the boxes. Submitted by Kim Stellhorn

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WILD FIRE SUPPORT

Texas is currently facing the worst drought and wildfire disaster in the history of the state. Fed by strong winds and fueled by sun baked vegetation, wildfires continue to rage in and about Harris County claiming hundreds of acres and forcing numerous evacuations. At the time this article was written



there have been 484 wildfires burning a total of 174,317 acres just in the last 7 days. During this time aircraft spent 137 hours in the air making 431 air drops using 344,230 gallons of water and retardant.

This is the last 7 of now 300 straight days of wildfire activity in Texas. Over the last 7 days there has been an influx of out of state assistance arriving to take some of the pressure off local responders. Prior to that, local fire services and the Texas Forest Service have born the brunt of the fire fighting effort. Fire fighters in Texas have been overwhelmed.

Four antique apparatus belonging to TGCS mem-

bers have been pressed into service over the past week to fight fire or stand by for residential area protection. Chuck Buschardt and his 1976 Mack Engine assisted Aldine Fire Department fighting a 125 acre fire just north of Bush Intercontinental Airport. His engine operated on the fire for several hours until it was

brought under control.

Bill Lofton re-equipped his 1953 American bumper pumper and placed it in his neighborhood. Wildfires burned on his neighborhoods north border for four days and re-kindles are more a probability than a possibility. Clinton Johnson's 1948 Mack Engine and 1964 Alf Ladder were made available to Harris County CERT members responding as support for local emergency services. At this time there is no weather related relief in sight. It is likely we will see more retired apparatus on scenes throughout the state.

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IFBA CONVENTION AND 9/11 REPORT

The International Fire Buff Associates, Inc. (IFBA) held its annual convention at the Hilton in Hasbrouck Heights, NJ on September 6-10, 2011. The Sunday after was the tenth anniversary of the 9/11 attacks of 2001. Many of the convention attendees attended ceremonies in the greater New York area to recognize that anniversary.

The convention was very enjoyable, with plenty of opportunities for apparatus photos as well as to see sights unique to the greater New York area. More than

On Wednesday night that week, most of the attendees boarded a harbor dinner cruise ship for three hours on the Hudson. The captain took the vessel around the lower tip of Manhattan and up the East River. Returning after the sun had gone down, the group was pleased and surprised to see the famous Ground Zero twin beacons turned on. The spotlights are only illuminated once a year on the anniversary of 9/11, but apparently a test was taking place as the ship passed the 9/11 site with the twin lights shining brightly into the foggy sky. The hosts said it was done for us. Right!

The next day the group was given a very special treat, an

up close look at the FDNY's newest and largest fire boat, the "343," named for the number of members killed on 9/11. The vessel docked at the port of Elizabeth, NJ for the close look. Officially called "Marine 1," the 50,000 gallon-per-minute boat has been in service for one year and cost the city \$27 million.



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BEAUMONT REUNION

Every body loves a story with a happy ending. Well, this happy ending is really just the beginning of a remarkable reunion and a future restoration for The Fire Museum of Texas in Beaumont

The year is 1931 and a new apparatus is introduced to the firefighting community, courtesy Beaumont, Texas. This intriguing apparatus doesn't carry any water, hoses, ladders, or extinguishers of any kind.



Only illumination - and lots of it! The Search Light Truck, as it was known, is the first-of-its-kind in the department, and possibly the nation. The Diamond Reo cab transported five 1500 watt, Crouse Hinds floodlights, and another 2000 watt for a total of 11.5 kilowatts. It was designed by Johnny Southwell,

Superintendent of the Electrical & Mechanical Division of the BFD and constructed by department employees. Shown are the department members that contributed to the project in front of the old downtown fire station on Wal-



nut Street that now serves as the museum.

It admirably served for 32 years lighting the night of many fires. Like many apparatus, though, time and technology would necessitate a change. In 1963, the now obsolete cab was replaced with a newer 1958 Chevrolet body, comprising 283-cubic inch V-8 engine. The Diamond Reo cab was sold, and it eventually



ended up in the hands of fire truck collector Sam Castner in New York. Time and distance would separate the two - cab and body - for nearly 50 years.

That would all change on Monday, July 25, 2011. Fire Chief Jack Maddox had worked diligently to see its return, and on that day the Beaumont Fire Museum staff and interested personnel greeted the 1931 BFD Light Truck's original



cab when it arrived from Dundee, New York. Sam Castner had decided to reduce his collection by one! With the help of several, the 1931 truck cab was rolled off the transport vehicle in front of the old downtown fire station, the same building it was housed during its 30-year life with BFD.

It looked a lot different than it did when it was used in the creation of the department's first light truck. However, there was adequate information to substantiate its authenticity. On the doors of



the cab were the words Beaumont Fire Department. And the previous owner also had the title that showed it had been sold by the city of Beaumont, Texas.

The cab is undoubtedly a welcome addition to the museum. The department still has his blueprints for the apparatus that was constructed in the firehouse. It also still has the movie theater generator and light rig that had been bolted to its frame. It just didn't have the cab. The museum is planning to reunite the Diamond Reo cab and the body, and restore to its pre-1931 condition.

The Olde 7ire Belle congratulates the Beaumont Fire Department and the Fire Museum of Texas on their happy reunion.
